Such a focus may seem obvious to those familiar with the location of the Victoria University College of Law and Justice and Sir Zelman Cowen Centre, right in the heart of Melbourne's legal precinct. This presents students with opportunities to learn from a variety of current practitioners and field experts and to do placements in the courts.

The Sir Zelman Cowen Centre has recently taken this focus on the Courts a step further with the establishment of the Courts and Tribunals Academy – launched by the Governor General Sir Peter Cosgrove and the Chief Justice Marilyn Warren in 2015. The Academy will be a Centre of excellence and learning on aspects of court management and contemporary issues.

Don't forget that the VULJ has now extended its reach, becoming available via Hein-Online, Austlii and AGIS+Text. Of course, the journal remains available on its primary website (vulj.vu.edu.au) and is very proud to report having over 38,000 page visits since being launched globally.
